GAS TAX FACTS

How do your fuel tax dollars fund Georgia Transportation?

HOW DOES IT WORK?

- The motor fuel tax, also known as the gas tax, is the most important source of transportation funding in Georgia.
- The Georgia gas tax has two parts:
 - The first is the motor fuel excise tax which is fixed at 7.5 cents per gallon.
 - The second part is a 4% gas sales tax, though only 3% goes directly to the state's highway trust fund. The other 1% goes into the general fund.
- Other transportation fees like advalorem tax go into the general fund and may or may not be used for transportation purposes.

2011 GDOT BUDGET

Georgia's motor fuel tax directly provided almost 35% of GDOT's 2011 budget and allowed the state to match federal funds. Those two sources made up nearly 94% of the entire GDOT budget. Federal funds are primarily from the federal gas tax.



The amount you pay in gas taxes depends on the mileage of your vehicle, but if your car gets 24 MPG, on average you pay \$16.32 per month in state gas tax.

- Gas tax receipts are collected by the Georgia Department of Revenue, put in the general fund, then reimbursed to GDOT for project expenses.
- The money raised by the gas tax can finance only road and bridge projects and maintenance of road infrastructure. Projects can include building new highways, widening existing highways repaving roads, and fixing traffic signals.
- Money raised by the gas tax cannot go to transit.





PROPORTION OF GAS PRICE DUE TO GAS TAXES




Over the past four years, state excise gas tax (7.5 cents/gallon) and federal gas tax (18.4 cents/gallon) did not change. Georgia's gas sales tax ranged from 7.1 cents/gallon to 12.1 cents/gallon. Over the same period, the average price of gas ranged from \$1.98 to \$3.63. Gas taxes only accounted for 11-19% of the price of gas.

STATE MOTOR FUEL EXCISE TAX






PER CAPITA TRANSPORTATION SPENDING (2006)

Georgia is **next to last** in transportation spending per US capita. Only Tennessee spends less per capita. On the Average other hand, Georgia DOT is responsible for maintaining and operating the **11th highest** amount of state lane miles with 47,192 miles.









Georgia has the **second lowest** state excise tax in the nation and has not increased it since 1971. Only Florida has a lower excise tax. Because the excise gas tax does not change, its "buying power" decreases

Federal gas tax is 18.4 cents on top of listed state taxes
